Getting to know spring wildflowers



Wild Garlic Distinctive smell of garlic; likes damp places; edible



Bluebell Flowers from April; indicates ancient woodland



Lesser Celandine Forms carpets of flowers earlier than buttercups; heart shaped leaves



Primrose Thick textured leaves; indicates ancient woodland



Cowslip Flowers hang to one side on longer stems than primrose



Dandelion Over 100 different types; superfood for early bees and insect

Wild Daffodil Smaller than domestic types; indicates ancient woodland



Ladies Smock Likes damp soil; orange tip butterflies lay eggs on this plant



Dog Violet Early violet; important for fritillary butterflies



Wood Anemone Another indicator of ancient woodland; important for hoverflies



Cow Parsley Often in hedgerows; fern-like leaves; important for pollinating insects



Forget-me-not Different types – wood, water and field; soil can turn them pink
